Subject: Culvert #45 & #77 Replacement – Tender Results

1. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that:

- Council AUTHORIZE the Chief Administrative Officer and Clerk to execute an
 agreement with Rudak Excavating Inc., for services outlined in the tender
 documents in the amount of \$397,200 plus HST, subject to approval of content
 by the Director of Infrastructure Services and to financial content by the Director
 of Corporate Services/Chief Financial Officer; and,
- 2. The surplus funding previously approved for this project in the amount of \$570,000 **BE RETURNED** to the General Reserve (0400);
- 3. Council AUTHORIZE the Chief Administrative Officer, or designate, to amend the agreement with Rudak Excavating Inc. if required to expand the scope of the work plan, provided such additional services remain within the remaining total project funding of \$580,000 inclusive of HST and subject to approval of content by the Director of Infrastructure Services and to financial content by the Director of Corporate Services/Chief Financial Officer.
- 4. Council **DIRECT** that any surplus funding realized upon completion of the project (722013 & 722014) be immediately returned to the General Reserve Fund (0400).

2. BACKGROUND:

Culvert #45 is located on Concession Road 6 North between Texas Road and Alma Street. It was identified in the highest priority culvert for replacement in the 2022 Bridge Inspections Report. Culvert #77 is located on North Side Road Between Concession Road 5 North and Concession Road 6 North. It was identified in the second highest priority culvert for replacement in the 2022 Bridge Inspections Report.

An RFP for engineering services was issued in the spring of 2023 and an agreement with RC Spencer was executed by the CAO on April 25th, 2023.

3. **DISCUSSION**:

On April 25, 2024 the Town advertised a Request for Tender (RFT) online for the Replacement of Culvert #45 & #77 via Bids and Tenders and on the Town's website. Tenders closed for this project at 11:00 a.m. on May 16, 2024. The Town received five tender submissions that were processed electronically via the Bids and Tenders system.

The tenders were reviewed electronically to ensure there were no mathematical errors or omissions. The tender results are:

RC Spencer Associates Inc. is the consulting engineer that completed the detailed design for this project. They have completed the review of the tender submissions and have recommended that the tender be awarded to the lowest bidder, Rudak Excavating Inc., Administration concurs with this recommendation.

Administration notes that the bids received are significantly lower than the original budget established using the 2022 Bridge Needs Study and lower than the budget estimate provided by RC Spencer. This recent tender cost will be provided the engineer who is completing the 2024 Bridge Needs Study and will be used to adjust future budget estimates accordingly.

2nd Concession Road Reconstruction

The 2nd Concession Road Reconstruction project was awarded by Council in January 2024 at a total project cost of \$4,038,005. When the project was about 30% completed it was identified that the project progress was not aligning with the tender items. A review of the tender item values by the consulting engineer (Hrycay Consulting) revealed that a significant area of the road reconstruction had be omitted from their calculations. This omission resulted in the tender quantities for excavation, granular placed, and asphalt tonnage being significantly undervalued and not in line with the work being completed or the materials being used. Administration is recommending that \$475,000 for the Reserve Fund – General be used to approve the budget shortfall. Further details on the 2nd Concession North Budget Exceedance are included in a separate Council report.

4. RISK ANALYSIS:

Not awarding this work would delay the replacement and improvements to infrastructure and could expose the Town to increased liability with respect to the condition of the bridge. Potential for road closures exists if scheduled culvert replacements are not completed.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

Based on the recommended tender and contract for design engineering/project management services, the financial impact for the project is estimated as follows:
