- It was their vision to promote the rich heritage of African Canadians, many of whose ancestors had escaped enslavement in the United States.





We are a community-based, nonprofit museum that tells the story of African Canadians' history and contributions by preserving and presenting artifacts that educate and inspire.



- Founded in 1975 The Amherstburg Freedom
 Museum, previously known as 'The North Black
 Historical Museum'.
- Amherstburg meant freedom, for many Freedom
 Seekers escaping enslavement and persecutive laws
 in the United States.
- The museum complex includes, the Nazrey A.M.E.
 Church national historic site and stop on the Underground Railroad, and the Taylor Log Cabin.














- He called the museum 'the largest, most significant black museum in this country.'

Mac shared his feelings about the day in a Windsor Star article from September 21, 1981, which said, "I feel wonderful, it's a day of thanksgiving ... I wanted this museum to be a monument to the God-fearing people who came here from slavery and



built churches, houses and business and passed on and were forgotten. They will live on in this museum."

- George McCurdy who was, at the time, director of the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission gave the keynote address
 - McCurdy said, "The North American Black Historical Museum will inevitably attract scholars, students, editors, publishers and people from many walks of life interested in black history and genealogy – particularly young people in search of their identities."

- In 2015, the North American Black Historical Museum celebrated its 40th anniversary, and changed its name to the Amherstburg Freedom Museum, to emphasize its connection to people seeking freedom.
- In addition to sharing Amherstburg's stories of the Underground Railroad, and the compassion and solidarity it took to make this network possible, the Amherstburg Freedom museum collects, protects, interprets, researches, educates and exhibits a collection of artifacts of historical and cultural value.



- As we approach the 50th anniversary of the Amherstburg Freedom Museum on September 20th, 2025, we are excited to celebrate this milestone and reflect on the important contributions the museum has made in preserving African Canadian history and culture.
- In recognition of this momentous occasion, we are reaching out to propose this initiative that we believe will further enhance the visibility of the museum and honor the legacy of its founder, Melvin "Mac" Simpson.
- In honor of our founder, Melvin "Mac" Simpson, whose vision and leadership established the Amherstburg Freedom Museum, we respectfully propose renaming a portion of King Street as "Mac Simpson Way."

- Mr. Simpson's tireless efforts in the community have left an indelible mark, and it would be a fitting tribute to honor his memory as part of the museum's 50th anniversary celebration. Adding this honorary name to King Street"
- We are confident this initiative will enrich Amherstburg's cultural landscape and strengthen the museum's role as a vital historical site. We kindly request the Council's support in recognizing Melvin "Mac" Simpson, his vision and accomplishments.
